Yale Book Awards Planned for Spring



Every spring, members of the Yale Club of Gainesville, present copies of *The Yale Shakespeare* to north central Florida high school sophomores. These students are nominated by their faculties and counselors as exhibiting "outstanding personal character and intellectual promise." Last year, fourteen area students were awarded this special recognition.

The Yale Book Award program seeks to identify students early in their high school years so that promising students are encouraged to maintain high goals and to expand their horizons. Yale alumni recognize over 450 young people worldwide each year.

Alumni always enjoy making these presentations during school recognition ceremonies, and find it well worth the effort to both help honor a promising young scholar and to promote Yale University to a future generation. A modest investment of time and money returns immediate and ongoing rewards.

Yale Night with Professor Paul Bracken

Yale's **Prof. Paul Bracken**, leading expert in global corporate strategy and national security, spoke to 22 alumni and friends at the Matheson Museum on "Iraq, North Korea and Weapons of Mass Destruction." He focused on how the US got to our current tense international situation.

Since the end of the Cold War, US policy has been deterrence and arms control, building coalitions with "responsible" nations (US, Britain, France, USSR, China) to limit WMD. In exchange, some 100 "non-responsible" nations promised not to develop nuclear weapons. This strategy worked for 25 years until India tested a nuclear bomb, followed in rapid succession by a Pakistani test, long-range missile firings by North Korea and Iran, and nuclear stockpiling by Israel and China.

This situation, coupled with UN failures in Rwanda and Serbia, and current terrorist threats, showed nuclear non-proliferation treaties were not working and the probability of war was increasing. So the US adopted the Doctrine of Pre-emption, militarily going after the threats to our security before they strike us first. The downside of Pre-emption is the fear it has raised in North Korea.

Prof. Bracken says the ineffectiveness of arms control, the UN and NATO has consigned them to irrelevancy. Some nations are threatened by Preemption. There is no broad strategic policy after Iraq. All of this cries out for new US policy and international institutions to guide us through the minefield of international tensions. A thought-provoking and sobering talk.


Tour of the Museum of Natural history "ranges"
